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# PUSHING UP THE PRICES...

**A**s many of you will now undoubtedly have realised, the College bars and The Sugarhouse underwent a change over the Easter vacation. This encompasses the changeover of the existing NUSSL (National Union of Students Services Limited) deal to supply our drinking establishments from Coors, which supplied Lancaster with Carling and Grolsch. The new deal provides us with Carlsberg and Tetley's. This will probably be a change that many people only notice due to the different pumps being installed in the bars, however the underlying consequences of this change runs far deeper.

Many people thought that this change would provide students with more competitive pricing and better deals. However this has not been the case since Ted Gaskill, the Trading Activities Business Manager,

has seized this opportunity to try and bring the campus bars in line with the industry by aiming to achieve an industry standard profit of 65% on every alcoholic beverage sold. This was brought to a head recently when a student was asked by a member of bar staff for £2.70 for a pint of Deuchars IPA. Little known to the staff at this point was that the prices had been raised centrally and programmed into the tills. This price was apparently a result of a mistake made by the University in its calculations.

The worse news for Real Ale drinkers is that one of the 'benefits' from this deal was the increase of the range of ales. The original list boasted over 100 ales however the reality of the situation is that there are really only on average a choice of 20 available to the licensees.

The price hike that has been implemented has also caused outrage from the College Principals, as well as the students, who despite apparently being informed of this by email claim they had received no such communication. The Principals were unhappy with this due to price increases in the College bars were said to have been 'set by the principals'. In this instance this was not the case. Reuben Edwards,

Furness College Principal, has already refused to endorse this price, in an effort to encourage the University to re-evaluate their decision with specific reference to bars on campus.

Dr. Edwards said: "£2.20 was a fairly competitive price for Real Ales and if the University increased this then it would be too much."

Currently the Principals are being asked to look at the prices for the next academic year. It seems that there are several options. Keep the same prices, increase the prices and lose the custom, or lower the prices.

Bars have been in financial decline since 2001. Price hikes have been the quick fix too many times. With the recent controversy surrounding bar prices and the way College bars operate the student body has been in uproar at the potential threat of losing a College bar. More recently the Vice-Chancellor set up a College Bar Financial Review Group. This group is set to report back on 30th May. Watch this space.

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# Careers On The Move

**L**ancaster University's Careers Service, the CEEC, previously found up a fire escape somewhere near the Chaplaincy Centre, has moved to a glamorous new location in Alexandra Square.

In a move designed to improve Lancaster's league table status in terms of Graduate recruitment, Careers wanted somewhere much more visible from which to run their operation and the reworking of University House proved ideal. The Director of CEEC, Paul Blackmore, told us that the move will mean a better service and that accessibility was something that had been a problem in the past.

"Our key mission is to enable students to make informed career decisions, become more employable and to help them succeed in reaching their goals. The more visible we are to students the more we can help them."

The new location seems to have attracted interest from those hungry for success as well as those hungry for Dragon ribs, with free food being distributed at the start of what was dubbed 'Relaunch Week'. There was also some 'alternative advice' from someone calling herself 'Mystic Bjorg' and somehow, even though the rain didn't hold off, nearly 300 people came along to see what was going on.

"Apparently over half of those who visited hadn't used our services before and it was only the new location that made this possible." Mr Blackmore said. "This is not something we could have ever dreamed of delivering in our previous location."



The new Careers office includes two interview rooms with digital display screens and study areas inside, all are visible from Alexandra Square because of the CEEC's 'shop window' design.

The trend is increasing for the top recruiters to open their applications to those at the end of their 2nd year, effectively meaning that students can start planning their careers during their 1st year.

Whilst this may sound intimidating, the CEEC do warn students that, "The graduate recruitment market is becoming increasingly competitive. Students can no longer just rely on a good degree. They will also need to develop commercial

awareness as recruiters can afford to be choosier than ever.

"Our services don't just relate to getting a graduate job. We can help students gain work experience through vacation work, classroom placements in local schools, paid project and placement work and voluntary work (at home and overseas). We also have a range of resources and advice for those researching postgraduate study options and funding."

The new Careers Service is located in Alexandra Square, you can't miss it.

# Medical School On The Horizon

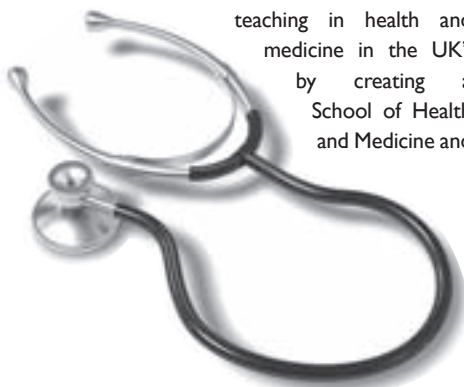

**A** proposal to develop medical education at Lancaster University has recently been written, aiming to establish an individual School of Health and Medicine. The paper has been put together for consideration and discussion at the May Senate.

A group, comprising of some of the leading doctors and professors in the departments of Medicine, Health, Management and Biology, have been meeting regularly to consider the future progression of the Health and Medicine department at Lancaster. In March, the group issued a group discussion report that clearly lays out its "Aim" to have "Within 3 to 5 years... established Lancaster University as a leading centre of excellence in research and teaching in health and medicine in the UK"

by creating a School of Health and Medicine and



"ultimately develop this into a faculty... and form the Lancaster Medical School."

October 2006 saw the first undergraduate medical students attend Lancaster University and joining the newly established Department of Medicine. The course has already received public praise from some of its students and the new Department has already attracted a £1.6 million Clinical Anatomy Learning Centre, earlier this year for the undergraduates. This was launched by Sir Liam Donaldson who is the Government's principle medical advisor on health issues and the Centre allows students to study the human body using intrinsic anatomical models.

The Department of Medicine at Lancaster is currently a collaborative venture with the University of Liverpool, the University of Central Lancashire (UCLAN), St Martin's College and the University Hospitals of Morecambe Bay NHS Trust. This collaboration was set-up to expand medical education and to increase the number of doctors in Lancashire and Cumbria. Presently, the undergraduates at Lancaster follow the same curriculum as the medical students at Liverpool and Lancaster students will also be awarded their degrees by the University of Liverpool, not Lancaster University.

The group that have structured this recent proposal do make it clear that they "are not in a great rush to become independent from Liverpool for medical education" but they stress their concern that the Department, as it stands, does "face the risks of needing to respond to any changes in Liverpool's

curriculum while we have our current relationship. If these are large...then they may be difficult for us to cope with."

In late March, the group introduced their objectives to the University Management Advisory Group (UMAG). The minutes of the meeting read that "The majority of the group had reached the view that the University should commit to a major development of this area by the establishment of a School of Health and Medicine...which would sit outside of the current three faculties." This objective is supported by some of the University's most respected Professors.

However, some ex-members of the group are opposed to the Department of Medicine moving out of the departments that it currently sits in. Mary Smyth, the Dean of the Faculty of Science and Technology, presented a contrasting proposal to the advocacy for an individual Medical School. At the UMAG meeting, she presented a paper outlining alternative proposals for the development of health and medicine within one single group, with Biomedicine remaining within Biological Sciences. She wants to avoid a "potentially damaging split between biomedicine and the rest of biological sciences."

UMAG, however, agreed to welcome the proposal that the University establish a new School of Health and Medicine and advised that an updated paper be written by the group with a view of putting the issues concerned to the May Senate.

Becky Heard, LUSU Education and Welfare Officer said: "The safety of our students on campus is of paramount importance to us. We urge you all to take extra care on campus at this time with the movement of heavy duty vehicles involved in building works. I wish a heartfelt speedy recovery to the student who was injured."

Police are currently investigating the matter.

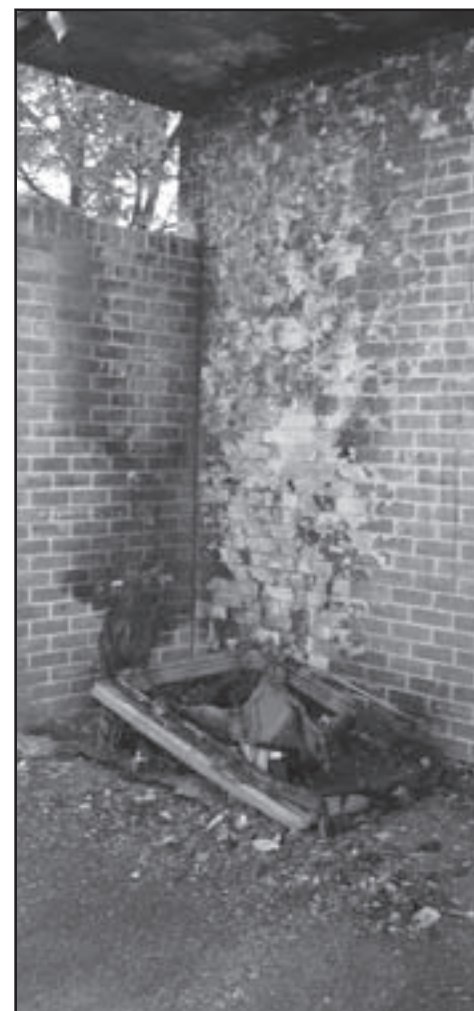

**We're all a little old for pipe dreams about golden tickets, glass elevators, and fat children drowning in chocolate, but a mere hour's drive into the Yorkshire Dales exists a similar magical factory. For those of you who only receive one piece of cheese a year for your birthday, this may be the day out you've been looking for.**

From the casual dairy enthusiast to the obsessive Wallace and Gromit

fan, everyone knows that Wensleydale cheese is one of the few things that the North of the country can do right. The Wensleydale Creamery is situated in the village of Hawes, pronounced 'whores'. and is absolutely every bit as exciting as it sounds.

The tour began with an educational video, which divulged historical cheese information that I certainly do not remember. However, I can tell you that in 1992 something happened that led to Wensleydale production ceasing. Then something else happened that led to Wensleydale production restarting just in time for Christmas. Fortunately,

Santa would still have been able to deliver cheese to the stockings of young Yorkshire children.

Before we went on a boat ride down the river of cheese, we explored several rooms littered with archaic cheese producing devices,

as well as a strange amount of hats and sinks.

We had phoned in advance to make sure that we would witness cheese being made, and this part of the experience did not disappoint. Peering through the glass onto the production floor we saw one of the workers lying in an empty cheese vat. Noticing our interference, he quickly got back to work and also managed to gather enough of his co-workers to mock us as we took photos of ourselves next to a cardboard cut out of Wallace and Gromit. A pre-recorded cheese information tape explained to us that the factory is particularly pleased that one of its employees is deaf and dumb, and that despite the individual's handicap, his condition is not being drawn attention to. He is probably thankful that he cannot hear how he is being martyred over the intercom to tourists, evidently eager to know the implicit human equality inherent in cheese production.

The rest of the Creamery tour included the option of cheese tasting and a restaurant, as well as a variety of spectacular attractions from experimental flavoured cheese, to television cheese. Afterwards, when we decided that returning to the restaurant for the cheese board would have resulted in a lactic coma, we wandered around the

Put yourself in his shoes, in his house. After several glasses of wine, and usually by the time

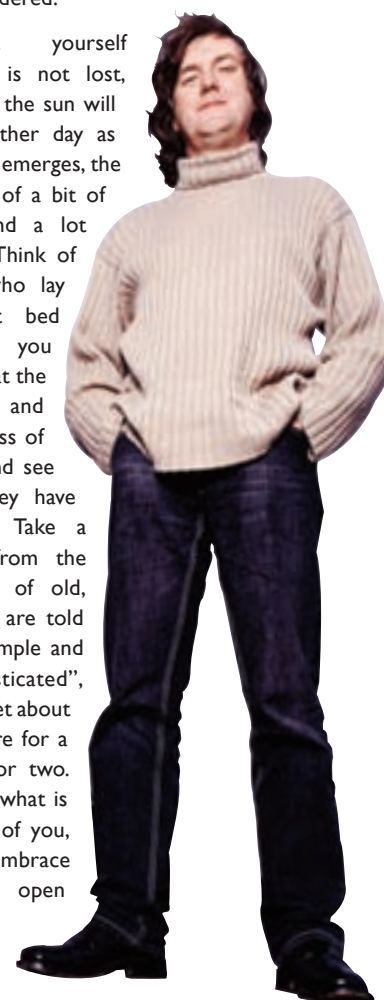

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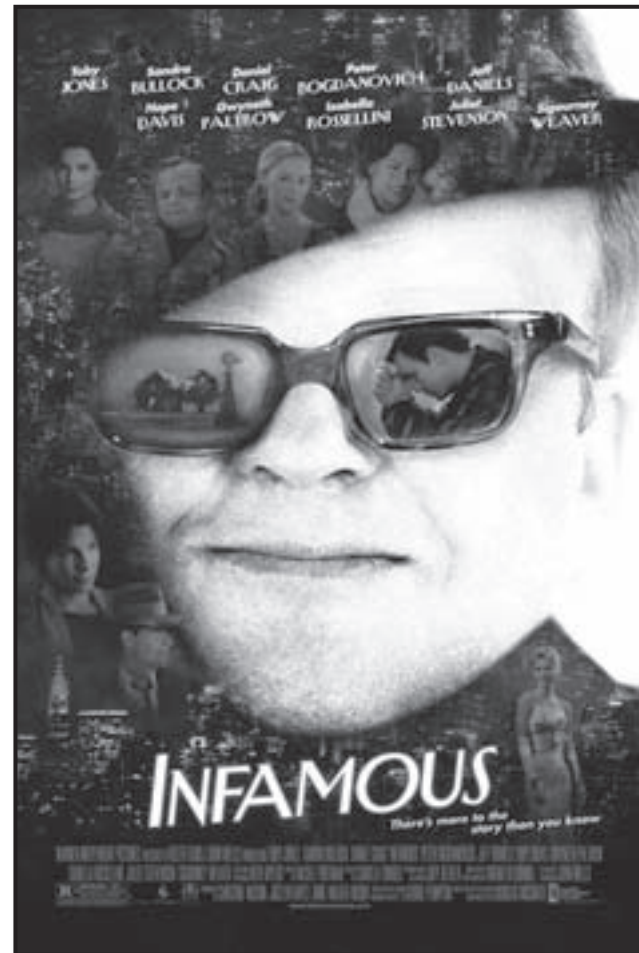

## The Truman Show

**T**here has been a lot of interest in Truman Capote in the last couple of years. This proves to be the second film on him within a year trying to follow the Oscar winning film *Capote* in 2005. Put bluntly, this film has a lot to live up to.

Firstly, there is little actual difference in terms of the plot in the two films; they both concern Capote's most successful book 'In Cold Blood'. It tells the story of a wealthy farming family in Kansas which were brutally murdered for apparently no motive.

This intrigues Capote and he eventually spends over five years putting this book together, interviewing many members of the small community and even the killers themselves, creating his most successful novel. However, the stresses of writing 'In Cold Blood' leads to Capote's own self-destruction. The film follows Capote in his quest to seek out answers to the crime. We see him writing the novel and the effects this has on him.

Unlike the 1995 version of *Capote*, the first thing you notice is the variety of filming techniques. These range from glitzy parties in New York, to a surprising

love story and docudrama by interviewing Capote's closest friends about how it affected him. Disappointingly, the interviewing technique doesn't work well with the actual story, interrupting the main plot which makes the film lack direction as it keeps changing so abruptly.

Nevertheless, there are some redeeming features. Toby Jones portrayal of Truman Capote is brilliant, as is Daniel Craig as Perry Smith, one of the killers. The scenes in the prison featuring Capote and Smith work well as both actors show how intense but fractured their relationship was. Smith lets Capote get close to him, before

threatening violence a minute later because he is not sure if he trusts him. This leads to a surprising love story between them, which appeared slightly exaggerated in film.

Sandra Bullock was completely miscast in the role of Nellie Harper Lee, Capote's close friend. Her performance is completely unconvincing with a terrible southern accent, unfortunately making her scenes appear amateurishness and misplaced.

Overall however, the film has its good moments but is sadly let down by lack of direction. *Infamous* is good, but will always be second place to *Capote*.

## Ace's Low

**W**hile it doesn't take a genius to tell that director, Joe Carnahan's film have been heavily influenced by the likes of Quentin Tarantino and Guy Richie, in his latest offering, *Smokin' Aces*, Carnahan seems to have brought little new to the genre.

The plot revolves around Buddy 'Aces' Israel (Jeremy Piven) a former Las Vegas casino performer. He is held in a penthouse hotel

room for his own safety, under threat of assassination, wanted dead for his deceitful ways.

Several different groups of assassins are gunning for him since he is believed to be a police informer; thus the mob have a \$1 million price tag on his head. Since there are over five different assassins visiting the hotel in an attempt to successfully assassinate Buddy and earn their pay cheque, predictably things do not run smoothly for anyone.

This is an action-packed, fast

paced film with flashy sets, drugs, prostitutes and lots of guns and violence. While Ray Liotta and Andy Garcia are inevitably drafted in to add mafia credibility, *Smokin' Aces* is littered with celebrity cameo appearances including Ben Affleck, Common and Alicia Keys.

Unfortunately this has the affect of making the movie seem more like a popularity contest than a film at times. Shoddy acting performances doesn't help disguise the fact that this film is more interested in slick shots crammed with movie stars than with genuine, absorbing drama.

All the assassins seem to fit into different stereotype clichés, such as Alicia Keys playing the black lady from the 'hood', whilst Ryan Reynolds of *Van Wilder* fame plays an FBI Agent with a conscience, a man who wants to make the difference and do the right thing.

However, despite all *Smokin' Aces* pre-final failings, the film does have an unexpected twist at the end, and even if rather confusing it does save Carnahan's gangster flick from being yet another predictable action film.

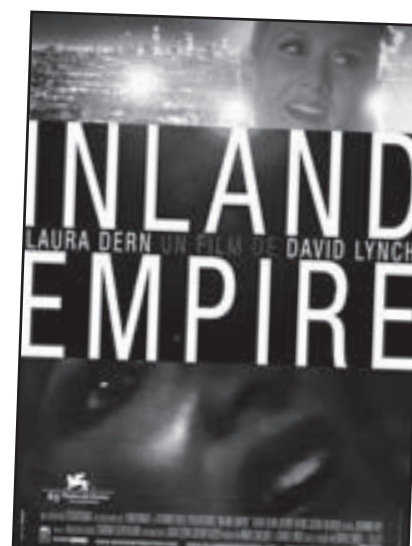
**I**NLAND EMPIRE has already come and gone after an extremely limited cinema release. Chances are you missed it. Following on from *Mulholland Dr.*, *INLAND EMPIRE* is David Lynch's first feature in five years. *INLAND EMPIRE*, (which Lynch insists on being capitalised) is possibly his most obtuse and downright weird film yet. The film needs to be three hours long, it is a film in which you come out and really

Don't be scared by the film's lack of plot, enjoy this freedom the film exhibits. **Usually, a nice way of saying that a film sucks a bit is stating that it's "one for the kids." Unfortunately, I can't even say that about Spiderman 3. In our 5:30pm showing on Friday, we had a particularly inattentive child, who was most definitely a Spiderman fan, dressed as he was in full costume, and who chose the most boring moments of the film to run around the seats at the front screaming "Spidermaaaaaan!" If Spiderman 3 was a film for the kids, this one wasn't buying it.**

Alright, so it doesn't fully suck. But it comes pretty close. The main premise of the film is never actually explained. Some pissed-off black goo from Outer Space plummets to earth in a comet at the beginning, while Peter Parker (Maguire) and Mary Jane Watson (Dunst) are lying on a giant web, very much in love, watching shooting stars and

exchanging mediocre dialogue. It then attaches itself to Peter's scooter, and eventually to Peter himself, and all we know is that it makes him wear black and get Very Angry. This goo isn't the only villain in the film. Eddie turns against Parker after he sabotages his career, and teams up with Flint Marko, an escaped convict who also wants to kill Spiderman (reasons unknown). After being caught in a molecular something or other, Marko, a buffed-up Thomas Haden Church, who seems to have forgotten all of his brilliant acting skills since the mighty Sideways, becomes Sandman, a big

stupid sand sculpture who robs banks so that he can afford better healthcare and more visitation rights for his daughter. I guess he never thought of joining Fathers 4 Justice and dressing up as Spiderman. On top of this, there's Harry Osborn who alleges that Spiderman killed his father, and is now bent on revenge.

Peter just doesn't know what to do, and seems to try and solve it by turning emo. Nobody likes this new Peter, apart from Peter himself. This is the only point in the film where Maguire abandons the idiotic smile and attempts the angriest expression he can think of: a slight frown. He also buys a suit (black of course) and tries to point at women on the street in a sexy manner. It is at this stage that Peter Parker loses any charm he ever had. Luckily, God seems to favour Spiderman, and the ringing of the church bells helps him tear off this "binding" black snot, which promptly makes its way to Brock. Brock is now Venom, yet another bad guy, who for some reason, despite the fact that his superpowers are granted him solely by the space jelly, seems to be a scary, toothier version of Spiderman, spinning giant webs and swinging around New York. The climax of the film, a predictable showdown between the four main protagonists was just not as exciting as it should have been. The presence of an appalling British actress as a news commentator did wonders for

sucking all the atmosphere and tension out of the scene. The fact that there were two bad guys and two good guys made for flighty and unexciting fighting; a far more satisfying climax would have come from a good old-fashioned two-man showdown.

Some very welcome relief came in the form of Bruce Campbell, the legendary actor from the Evil Dead trilogy, also directed by Sam Raimi. He plays a marvellously French maitre d' at the restaurant Peter chooses to propose to Mary Jane, and although he's by far the best actor in the film, he doesn't strut around like he knows it. As far as other cult celebrities go, Stan Lee puts in a predictably rubbish appearance, turning up at Peter's side on the street and saying something along the lines of "Spiderman is so great, and I have lots of money, which means I can shit all over it by allowing these movies." Actually, the

entire film was transmitting that message, and the overall lesson seemed to be that you will most definitely succeed in life if you are a) American, b) Christian, and c) not black. The core theme was forgiveness, and some little shits got away with murder (literally). Well, it'd ease the pressure on the overcrowded prison system anyway, and no-one seemed particularly concerned about the escaped convict by the end of the film (an event that surely should occur just once in a film, but happens three times in this one). I'm not going to pretend this film didn't have its merits. It had the feel-good triumph over evil element, and I liked the cheesy "Look mommy! Over there! **O**nce in a while an album comes along which you know you're going to hate from the outset. It could be an awful, grinding opening riff, it could be a horribly nasal vocal. Conor Oberst's is a voice you're sure you've heard before but whilst this inevitably nags at you, the strength of the songwriting is such that you are soon being whisked away on the *Bright Eyes* adventure and nothing else seems to matter.

'Hot Knives', featuring such lyrical gems as "I've made love, yeah, I've been fucked, so what?", builds to become another fantastic track

and 'Soul Singer In A Session Band', "I had a lengthy discussion about 'The Power of Myth', with a post-modern author who didn't exist" is pure genius.

In fact, 'Cassadaga' is the sort of story-telling Americana that has the potential to become a future classic. Think Neil Young, think *Decemberists*, think *Shins* and think even a Stateside Liam Frost. It really is that good and better.

Whilst it may take you some time to really appreciate the slower tempo slow burners, it'll be more than worth your while in the end. 'Cassadaga' is an album that should grace any CD collection.

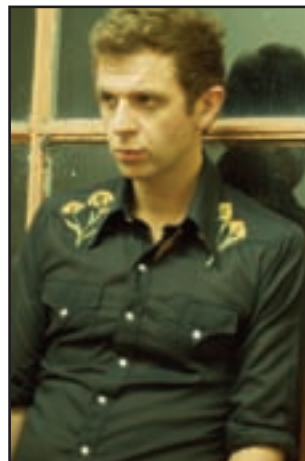
**Bloc Party: I Still Remember**

**B**lack Rebel Motorcycle Club's fourth album reintroduces much of the swirling shoe-gazing scuzziness that has become their trademark, but was lacking on their last offering, 'Howl'. Drummer Nick Jago is reunited with his bandmates and together they take a stab at recapturing the quality of their self-titled debut.

Fans of the band's first two albums will be pleased to know the meat of this album does not stray too far from their familiar dark *Jesus and Mary Chain* snarlings and raging

riffs. 'Took Out a Loan' and 'Need Some Air' are straightforward rockers, but elsewhere a refreshing new intensity is discovered. 'Weapon of Choice' and 'Berlin' are both fitted with a turbo charger and additional swagger.

The real key to 'Baby 81's' success is BRMC's ability to combine their familiar sound with additional ambition and sincere emotion. Slow-burner 'All You Do is Talk' unfolds into their first stadium-sized anthem, while the epic 'American X' is a dark, sprawling jam, spreading out over 9 minutes. Meanwhile, the slow shuffle of '666 Conductor' would have been at home on 'Howl', supplying blue-

socked acoustic licks from the same mould as *The Black Keys*.

At one hour, the album is over-long and a few tracks should never have made the cut. 'Cold Wind' and 'Not What You Wanted' achieve nothing other than showing off that Robert Levon Been can play the guitar and sneer at the same time. It's like listening to the *Stereophonics*. However, this shouldn't detract from what is, on the whole, an excellent album. It's impressive, how a band can mature and open themselves up emotionally, but still sound as dark and edgy as ever. It's never felt so good to be back in black.

# Bad Day For Lancaster Badminton

**Lancaster suffered a torrid day in the Sports Hall as all of the fourteen points on offer in badminton went**

**to the hosting institution. The mixed side, men's 1sts and 2nds, as well as the women's 1sts were all overpowered by the power and precision of the York squad.**

The day began with the mixed

side and the men's 2nds playing simultaneously. Being the first event of Friday's play - preceded only by the previous day's equestrianism in the whole tournament - Lancaster were keen to produce an inspiring opening gambit. However, this also meant that an early morning

had been required for the Red Rose side in order to meet their 11am start time, and this told as the Lancaster sides in both matches got off to slow starts.

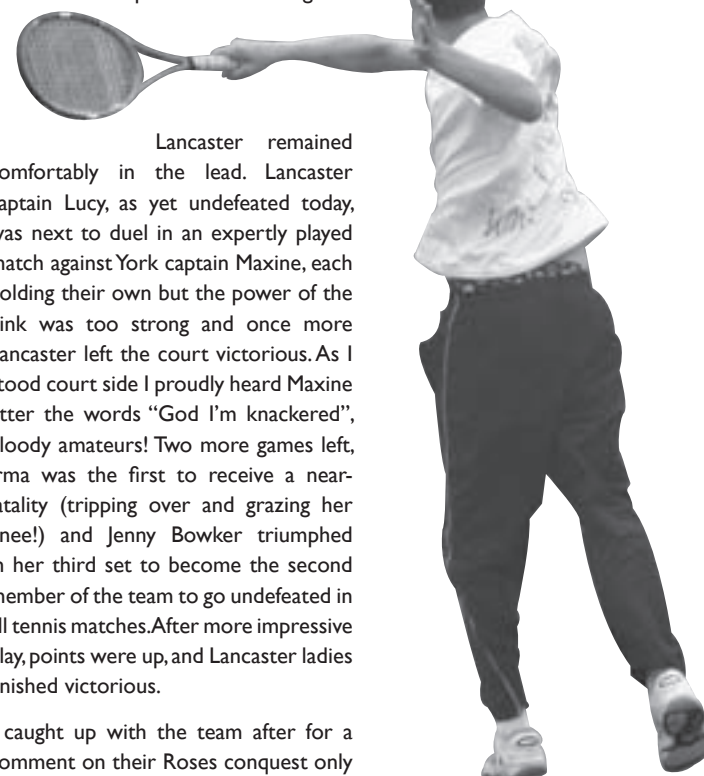
Captain John Mills commented on "huge commitment from all the players who slogged their guts out all afternoon in the heat" making Lancaster proud.

I caught up with the team after for a comment on their Roses conquest only

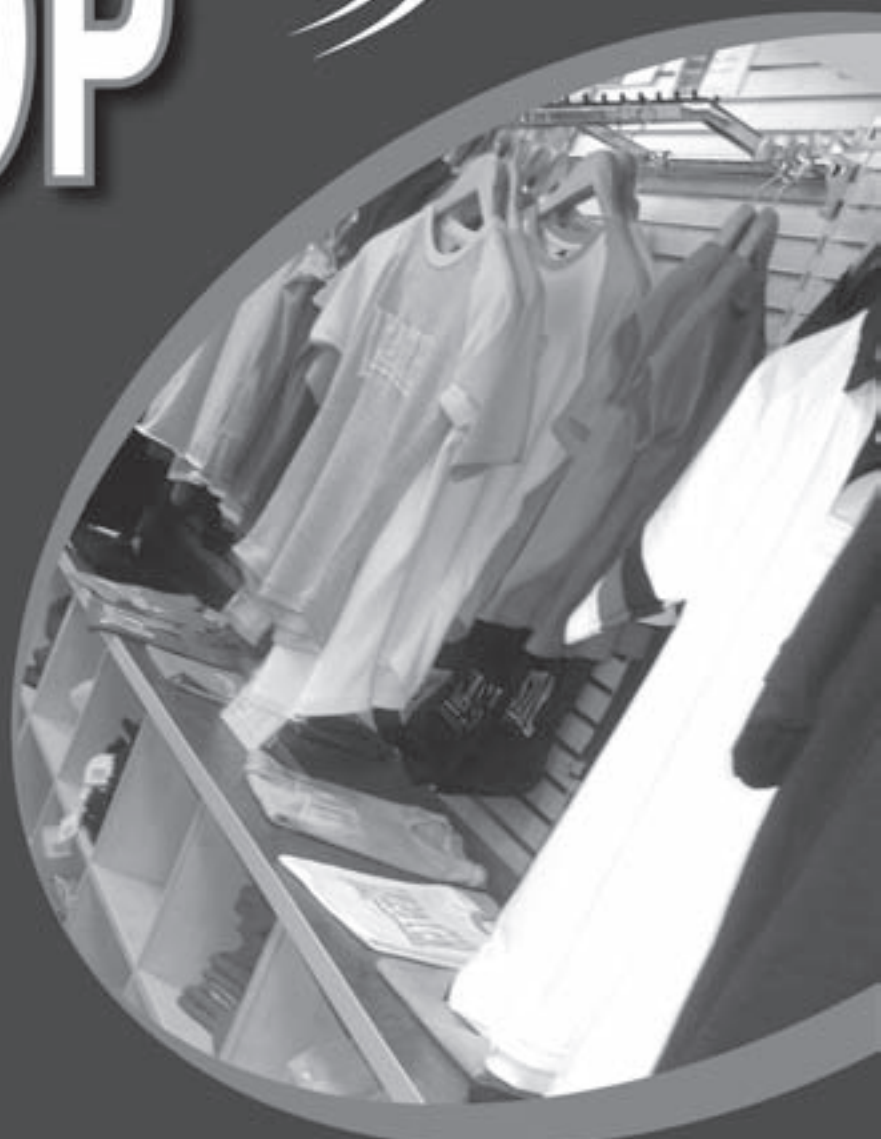
to receive a rehearsed use of alliteration, so here you have it; "pink ladies perform to perfection." Oh dear.

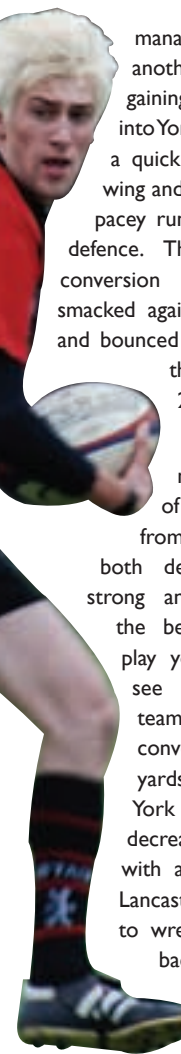

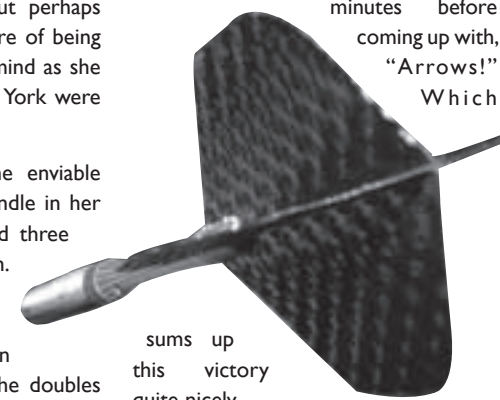

York did pull this back a little, but a 45-33 lead after our supposedly weakest weapon boosted confidence and boded well for

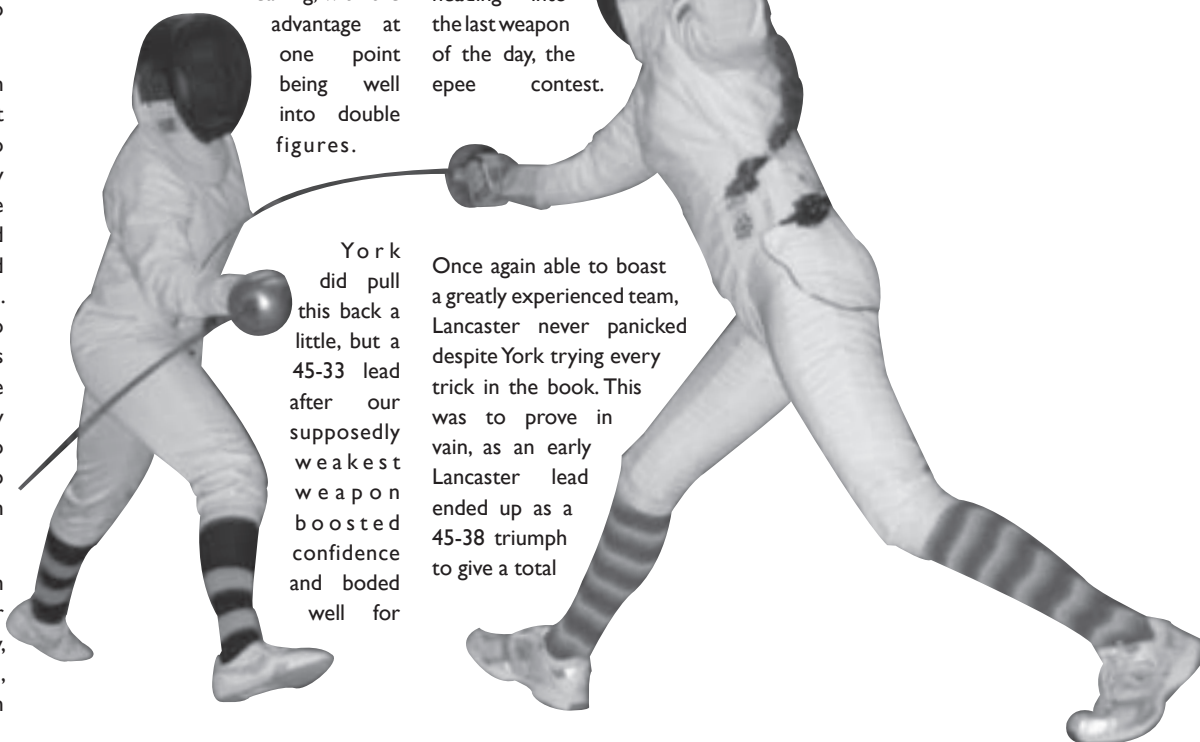
the remainder of the encounter.

# ROSES 2007: LANCS GET BEATEN!

Once again an away trip for Lancaster meant defeat in the annual War of the Roses Tournament. Although Lancaster Athletic Union President Dave Greenshields had predicted great things for the Red Rose side, Lancaster's superior BUSA rankings proved irrelevant as York unfortunately dominated many of the events from the start.

Although there were great wins in the Rugby, Football and Ultimate Frisbee on the Friday, Squash, Badminton and Thursday's Equestrian disappointed and the score was a shocking 49.5 to 15.5 going into
